<b>3. <b>4. Youth participating in 4-H school enrichment programs.</b> <i>Groups of youth receiving a sequence of learning experiences in cooperation with school officials during school hours, to support the school curriculum. <b>5. Youth Participating in 4-H individual study/mentoring/family learning programs.</b> <i>Planned learning which occurs independent of a formal group setting such as a club, as an individual, paired, or family learning effort. <b>6. Youth participating in School-Aged Child Care Education Programs.</b> <i>Educational programs offered to youth outside of school hours, usually in a school or other community center and incorporating 4-H curricula. **Indirect Volunteer -** Unpaid support for the 4-H program by a youth or adult which does not include face-to-face contact with youth. e.g.: boards, committees.

**Middle Managers -** Unpaid service to or leadership of other volunteers by a youth or adult, beyond the club or unit level.

**Duplications Not Eliminated -** Include each volunteer in a race x sex blank for each classification of service which they have performed in the reporting year.

**\*Duplications Eliminated -** Include each individual in only one race x sex blank. The "Duplications Eliminated" total is the actual number of different individuals who performed volunteer service for 4-H during the year.

**Racial Ethnic Classification -** This information is requested only to gather statistics and determine compliance with Civil Rights Laws. See the explanation in the Definitions section.
