

Instructions For Completing The State 4-H Enrollment Report (2010)

This workbook consists of 5 spreadsheets and will be filled out at the state level. Along the bottom of this screen you will notice 6 tabs, including this "Instruction" tab. As you click on the tabs, you will see different spreadsheets where the state compiled data will be entered in the blank cells. You will also notice that there are comment fields that provide help or definitions should something be not clear. Just "mouse-over" the field in question, and a box will pop-up with the necessary information. An example is provided below:
